It is delivered through an easy to use touch screen system (each resident touches their own picture to access their own personalize programs). Programs include email, skype, games, family posted pictures and videos, websites, music, tv, film, travel, lifelong learning, Veternas history, sports, reminisce, health & wellness, games & puzzles, stay connected, spiritual, staff tools, and therapy. As a result of participating in IN2L, elders have demonstrated significant improvements in a number of areas: IN2L participants are significantly more active, more energetic, and are at higher functioning levers; they demonstrate greater levels of activity and social engagement behaviors; they function at higher cognitive levels; they express more positive emotions and are less depressed; they demonstrate greater self-efficacy; they experience greater quality of life; and they have better general health. IN2L also helps residents sustain therapies for longer periods of time, keeps residents cognitively stimulated, assists in the delivery of group exercise and activity programs, and has proven to help people suffering with dementia. Lander Grinspoon Academy	\$2,526	<i>Focus On Me</i> An increasing number of elementary school students have special needs, particularly with attention and writing. Lander Grinspoon Academy strives to meet the needs of as many students as possible, with a very limited budget. This program would allow us to expand the materials that we can make available to improve students' cognitive, physical, sensory, and motor skills. Items purchased would support students' writing habits (slant boards,

		a variety of grips, and other writing tools), ability to focus in class (wiggle seats, foot bands, sensory rulers, weighted lap pads, etc.), and ability to self soothe and calm down (balance beam, dizzy board, sensory sack, indoor swing, etc.) Cost: \$2,526
Lander Grinspoon Academy	\$3,200	STEAM Ahead! STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) are the five elements of education which are seen as vital to keeping America a global leaders. Increasing numbers of professions require the skills of science and innovation. As a result, LGA sees the need to improve our already strong science curriculum. The LGA science curriculum incorporates chemistry, Biology, Physics, Earth Science and Environmental Science as part of each grade (Kindergarten through 6th grade). We would like to purchase 2 microscopes that would connect to a computer, allowing students and teachers to project what they see under a microscope onto a smart board and also allow images to be saved to a computer and manipulated. We would also purchase a digital scale, allowing experiments to be more precise. In addition, we plan to increase the number of experiments that each grade conducts each year and make more use of Abundance Farm as part of our Life and Earth Science Units in each grade. Mak'hela, the Jewish Chorus of Western Massachusetrts	\$6,200	<i>George Frederic Handel's masterwork, the oratorio, Esther, composed in 1718</i> Mak'hela, the Jewish Chorus of Western MA, requests funding in the total amount of \$8,200 for the 2014-1015 season. This includes the cost of two very different projects. Project 1: To present a large excerpt (or the entirety) of George Frederic Handel's masterwork, the oratorio Esther, composed in 1718. Esther tells the Purim story in the musical language of the early 18th century. This compelling musical work is infrequently performed, yet has the historical distinction of being quite possibly the first English oratorio. It has great significance to a Jewish audience as it tells the story of a major Jewish holiday. Performing Esther would be a monumental project in terms of the amount of challenging music for Mak'hela to learn and would be a six month-long process. The score is for a small orchestral ensemble consisting of violin I,II, viola, cello/bass, oboe I,II, and harpsichord. Because of the necessity of doubling most string instruments for balance, the minimum component of the orchestra would be: 2 oboes, 4 violins, 2 violas, 1 cello, 1 bass and harpsichord. Mak'hela's regular accompanist would play the harpsichord part (that would be part of the accompanist's salary). The other instrumentalists would need to be hired for 2 rehearsals and the concert, at a fee of \$400 each player. In addition, 4 professional-level singing is required). These soloists would also be compensated at a rate of \$400 each singer. The cost of the musical scores for each chorus member is \$15, therefore the price of scores for a 40-voice choir would be \$600. The total cost of mounting the performance of this exciting work would be \$6,200. Thank you very much for your consideration.

Mak'hela, the Jewish Chorus of Western Massachusetrts	\$2,000	Update and expand Mak'hela's Choral Library To update and enhance Mak'hela's choral library of musical scores. Sheet music is quite expensive, and, in order to continue to program new and stimulating music to present to Mak'hela's audiences, much more sheet music needs to be purchased (so that Mak'hela is restricted to performing previously sung music). Cost: \$2,000
Rachel's Table	\$500/family (Up to \$11,500 for the year)	A joint program of Rachel's Table and Jewish Family Service, ESSENtials
Springfield Jewish Community Center	\$1,500	<i>Stand and Salute</i> The JCC is replacing the single flagpole on the Dickinson Street side of the building with 2 flagpoles, 1 for the American and 1 for the Israeli flag. A donation has been made to cover some of the costs of the new poles, but \$1,500 is still needed.
